8.	*Non-Shelf Stable Foods: Foods that require refrigeration/freezing as packaged. Items include but are not limited to: raw and uncooked meat, poultry, seafood, etc.; dairy products including yogurts, cheese, ice cream and milk; and hotdogs/sausages, and packaged goods that require refrigeration/freezing until served. Non-Shelf Stable items are not permitted in patient packages and will be disposed of for health and safety reasons, if received in a patient's package. 10.	Undergarments Clarification  #35 on the Statewide Contraband List states undergarments are an exception to Non-State Issued Clothing. Health & Safety concern due to the lack of resources to wash personal undergarments. Public Health concern if the undergarments are not appropriately washed. Title 22 Section 73665
11.	Digital Media received through patient packages that are not manufactured sealed. Digital media includes but is not limited to CDs/DVDs, thumb drives, SD Cards, and memory cards.	a. b.	Presents safety and security risk because Property/Package Room staff are unable to verify contents of the digital media. Increased risk of contraband introduced into the facility.
12.	Beading Needles, <u>except under supervision</u> <u>during a structured beading/leather work group</u> . <u>Beading Needles will be supplied by the group facilitator.</u>	a. b.	Poses a safety and security risk because the needle can be utilized as a weapon. Utilized to jam locks or pick locks.
13.	Laser hair removal devices/systems.  (NoNo Hair Remover will not be considered contraband if approved by the treatment team)	a.	Laser hair removal devices/systems present a safety risk (skin burns) to the patients. Staff members at DSH-C are not trained on the proper use or supervision of laser hair removal devices/systems.
14.	Ice Chests and Insulated Bags	a. b.	Vector Control Issue Unable to verify and maintain the temperature of perishable food items.
15.	Mixing Spoons shall be considered contraband if they are longer than 10 inches in length.  Mixing spoons made of wood or polycarbonate will be considered contraband.	a. b.	Wood and Polycarbonate utensils/spoons are rigid and pose a safety and security risk as weapon stock. Mixing spoons beyond 10 inches could be considered a weapon.
16.	Zip Ties	a. b.	Choking/Hanging Risk. Potentially utilized as a form of handcuffs.
17.	Tool Clarification (#53 on Statewide Contraband List). Tool Accessories that present a safety security risk to the facility shall be considered contraband. This includes but is not limited to: polishing compounds/wheels, drill bits, flashlights, etc.	a. b.	Tool Accessories can posed an escape risk to the facility. Tool Accessories can be utilized to manufacture weapons.
18.	Cleaning Chemicals	a.	If utilized without proper protective equipment can result in injuries to staff and patients including chemical burns.

19.	Safes	a. b. c.	The use of safes would prevent staff from conducting thorough searches. Trip, slip, fall hazard. Could be utilized as a weapon depending upon the size and weight.
20.	Luggage Clarification  #29 on the Statewide Contraband List states Luggage is considered contraband. DSH-C considers luggage to be bags larger than 18"x14"x8".	a. b. c.	Potential trip, slip, fall hazard. Increased risk for concealing contraband. Luggage larger than the approved size will not fit inside the approved storage areas inside the patients' room.
21.	Fruit and Vegetable Seeds	a. b. c.	Health and Safety concerns due to possible food borne illness. CDPH deficiencies for inadequate cleaning process prior to consuming. Increased risk of patient manufactured alcohol (Pruno).
22.	Power Strip Adapters and Extension Cords	a. b.	Electrical overload Fire risk
23.	Food Products without factory seal  Food products received in the package room that are not factory sealed will not be issued and will be considered contraband.	a. b. c.	Health and Safety concerns due to possible food borne illness. Vector control issues. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention Food Borne Illness Guidelines.
24.	Area/Prayer Rugs larger than 40 inches by 60 inches will be considered contraband.  Area rugs shall only be utilized for spiritual prayer and spiritual path markings.  Bed coverings including blankets and fleece throws are not to be considered prayer rugs or spiritual rugs.  Area rugs shall not be utilized as floor coverings or room decorations and shall be properly stored when not in use.	a. b.
